The Silent Struggle:

A Story of Hope and Healing in Diabetic Foot Care

At a bustling tertiary-care hospital in Pakistan, the corridors often echo with the sounds of determination, the shuffle of feet learning to walk again, the quiet prayers of patients awaiting recovery, and the steady hum of doctors and nurses who refuse to give up on hope. Among them, a team of dedicated clinicians embarked on a mission to uncover one of the most pressing yet overlooked complications faced by diabetic patients; the cycle of re-amputation.

Their story began with countless charts and patient files — each representing a life touched by diabetes, a disease that slowly but relentlessly weakens the body's ability to heal. Some of these patients had already endured the heartbreak of losing a toe, a foot, or even part of a leg. Yet, despite their courage and medical intervention, they found themselves back in the hospital, facing another amputation.

This haunting pattern raised a question that could not be ignored:

Why were so many diabetic patients returning for repeat amputations?

The research team decided to find out. They meticulously studied the records of diabetic foot patients who had undergone amputation. Each file told a story — of long-standing diabetes, of wounds that refused to heal, and of complications that spiraled out of control despite best efforts.

Through months of analysis, a pattern began to emerge. The frequency of re-amputation was alarmingly high, revealing the harsh reality of life for many diabetic patients in low-resource settings. But more importantly, the team identified the key factors behind this cycle.

Patients with poorly controlled diabetes, blocked blood vessels, and severe nerve damage were most at risk. Many had suffered from recurrent infections, often worsened by delayed treatment or limited access to proper wound care. Others struggled because of inadequate post-operative care, lack of specialized footwear, or the simple challenge of managing a complex disease while living in financially constrained circumstances.

Behind every data point was a human story of pain, resilience, and endurance. A man who had lost his job after an amputation, a woman who could no longer walk her children to school, an elderly patient who clung to faith that his next surgery would finally be his last.

For the researchers, these were not just statistics. They were reminders of why this work mattered. The study's findings reinforced an urgent message: re-amputation can often be prevented through early detection, multidisciplinary care, and patient education. It was a call for better follow-up, vascular evaluations, and the establishment of specialized diabetic foot and wound care centers, where healing could begin before irreversible damage was done.

Their conclusion carried both warning and hope. While re-amputation remains a grim reality, it is not an inevitability. With coordinated medical care, consistent monitoring, and community awareness, lives and limbs can be saved.

In the end, the study stood as more than a research project. It became a testament to compassion in medicine; a reminder that even in the most challenging circumstances, knowledge and empathy can walk hand in hand toward healing.

Academic Sessions on Advanced Wound Care Successfully Concluded

The first session, **“Venous Insufficiency: Clinical Insights and Management,”** was held on December 5 and provided valuable insights into the diagnosis and management of venous disorders. This was followed by the second session, **“Role of Hyperbaric Oxygen Therapy in Wound Care,”** conducted on December 6, where participants gained a comprehensive understanding of the applications and benefits of hyperbaric oxygen therapy in complex wound management.

The sessions were delivered by esteemed speakers **Dr. Usman Waheed, MD, FACS**, Fellow of Johns Hopkins Hospital and Specialist in Trauma Surgery & Surgical Critical Care, and **Dr. Zaid K. Mirza, MD, FACP, MBA**, whose expertise and practical perspectives were highly appreciated by the audience.

Both lectures witnessed active participation, with attendees expressing keen interest throughout the presentations. The sessions concluded with interactive question-and-answer discussions, allowing participants to engage directly with the speakers and clarify clinical queries, making the sessions both informative and intellectually stimulating.

The overwhelming response and positive feedback from the audience reflected the success of these educational activities and reinforced DOTS' commitment to continuous medical education and excellence in patient care.

CME Session on Revision Mastoidectomy



On Tuesday, July 29, 2025, the Department of Otorhinolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery Unit-I at Dr. Ruth KM Pfau CHK-DOW Medical College-DUHS successfully hosted a Continuing Medical Education (CME) session on "Revision Mastoidectomy" Held at the PDC-DMC & OT Complex Dr.Ruth KM Pfau CHK, the event provided significant learning opportunities for ENT surgeons and postgraduate trainees.

A highlight was the guest lecture by Dr. Ahmed Nawaz, HOD of ENT-Head and Neck Surgery at Liaquat National Hospital, who presented on "Endoscopic Ear Anatomy and Middle Ear Ventilation Pathway" Dr. Nawaz also performed a live endoscopic revision mastoidectomy, emphasizing its benefits: enhanced visualization of critical structures like the sinus tympani and

Eustachian tube. This, he explained, is crucial for thoroughly eradicating pathology, leading to more complete disease clearance, reduced residual disease, faster healing, and lower re-recurrence rates, ultimately improving surgical success and hearing restoration

The program was meticulously directed by Prof. Dr. Zeba Ahmed, HOD of ENT-Head and Neck Surgery Unit-I at Dr. Ruth KM Pfau CHK-DOW Medical College, DUHS. This CME significantly contributed to the professional development of participants, enhancing their understanding of revision mastoidectomy techniques, ear anatomy, and practical surgical applications, underscoring DUHS's commitment to medical education.



A Successful CME Session on Thyroidectomy

On July 24th, 2025, A Successful CME Session on Thyroidectomy organized by the Department of Otorhinolaryngology – Head & Neck Surgery, Unit I, the event commenced in the well equipped OT Complex of Dr. Ruth K. M. Pfau Civil Hospital. It drew a diverse audience, including ENT faculty, general surgeons (Prof. Nasir Ahmad, Director OT COMPLEX Dr. Bilal Ahmed, Prof. Sadaf Zia, Dr. Uzma, Dr. Tehmina, Dr. Danish, Dr. Rajesh, Prof. Imrana), and numerous ENT postgraduate trainees from DUHS, JSMU, Bahria University, and Indus Hospital.

The session's highlight was Guest Faculty Dr. Nadir Ahmed, MD, FACS, a distinguished Otolaryngologist and Chair of Otolaryngology-Head & Neck Surgery, Professor of Surgery, and Director of the Head & Neck

Cancer Program at Cooper University Hospital/Cooper Medical School/MD Anderson Cancer Center at Cooper, based in Camden, New Jersey.

Expertly directed by Prof. Dr. Zeba Ahmed, Head of Department, ORL-HNS Unit I, DMC – DUHS, the program featured a keynote lecture on "Surgical Management of Thyroid Gland Diseases" and a live thyroid surgery by Dr. Nadir, offering invaluable insights into advanced techniques. The session emphasized the critical blend of anatomical knowledge, surgical expertise, and teamwork, highlighting the vital multidisciplinary approach essential for optimal patient care in thyroid disorders, and reaffirming DUHS's commitment to advancing medical knowledge and skills.



LADD'S PROCEDURE

FOR MIDGUT VOLVULOUS DUE TO INTESTINAL MALROTATION

An 18-year-old female ,unmarried resident of larkana presented with six months of intermittent abdominal pain and three months of progressive bilious vomiting and 15 kg weight loss. She got admitted to hospital in larkana and was later referred to Civil hospital Karachi due to unavailability of expertise.

Our Examination revealed hypotension, malnutrition, and electrolyte imbalances. Imaging demonstrated features of intestinal malrotation with midgut volvulus, including right-sided clustering of small bowel loops (figure 1a), whirlpool sign (figure 1b), and reversal of the SMA–SMV relationship (figure 1c). She also had

reduced left ventricular ejection fraction (30%), which improved to 55% after medical optimization. Therefore diagnosis of midgut volvulus due to intestinal malrotation with reversible cardiac dysfunction was made.

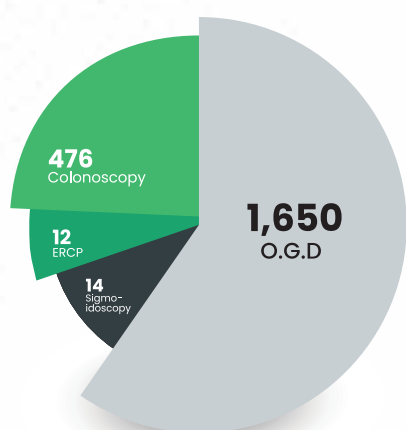
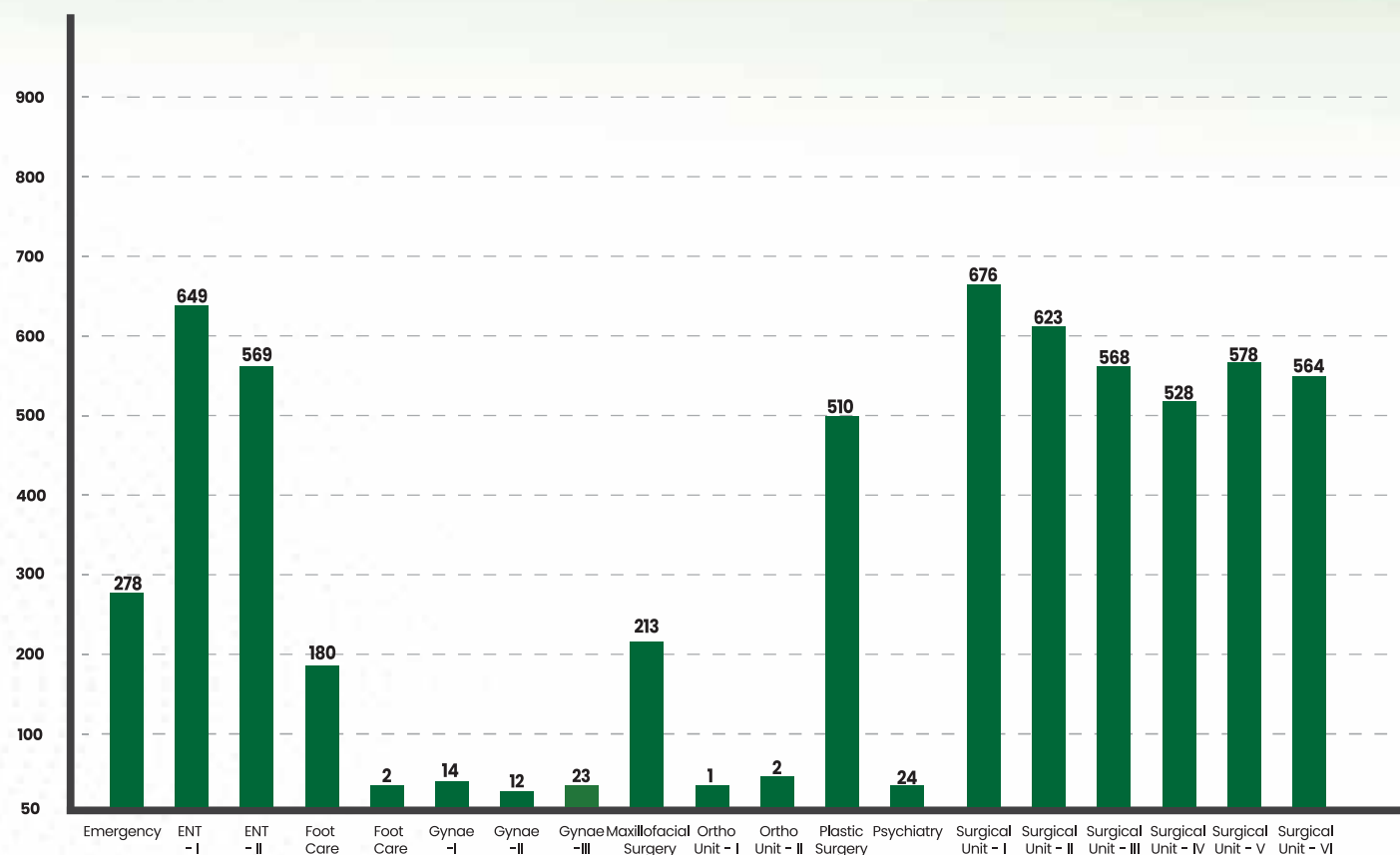


Figure 2.2: Repositioning the small bowel to the right and large bowel to the left

After stabilization, she underwent laparoscopic exploration converted to open surgery, where twisting of the duodenum, abnormal bowel positioning, and Ladd bands were found (figure 2.1). A Ladd's procedure with prophylactic appendectomy was performed. The small bowel was repositioned to right and large bowel to left (figure 2.2). Her postoperative course was uneventful.

She was discharged on day 7 with advice for gradual dietary advancement and cardiac follow-up and she fully recovered after 4 weeks.

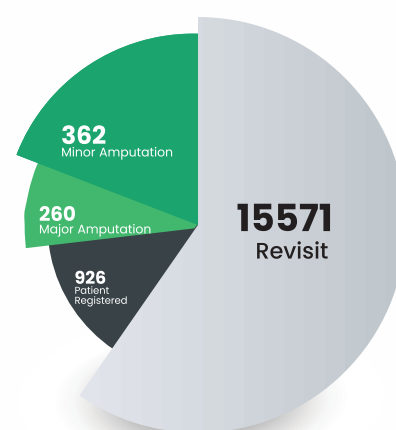

Opinion

Notes to the Financial Statements

1 STATUS AND ACTIVITIES

DOWITES 78 OPERATION THEATRE WELFARE SOCIETY is a non profit organization registered on February 24th, 2006, under the Voluntary Social Welfare Agencies (Registration and Control) Ordinance, 1961 (XLVI of 1961) given registration No. DSW(2561)-K, and has been granted registration on under the said Ordinance, Dowites 78 has been formed with the primary aim to construct, maintain and extend the operation theatre complex project at civil hospital, karachi, built by Dow Graduates (Dowites'78) of 1978, which complex/project is consisting of fourteen fully equipped operations theatres in civil hospital premises widely known as Dowites 78 Operation Theatre Complex for the welfare and rehabilitation of patients and to meet its recurring expenditures in the future. The operation of Dowites 78 are financed by donations, grants and endowments (in cash or kind). The current office of the society is located at Dowites 78, operation theatre complex, Civil Hospital Baba-e-Urdu road, Karachi,

2 STATEMENT OF COMPLIANCE

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Generally Accepted and best practice Accounting principles and standards as applicable in Pakistan.

3 SUMMARY OF MATERIAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

3.1 Basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

3.2 Property, plant and equipment and depreciation

Property, plant and equipment are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses, if any.

3.3 Accounting convention and basis of preparation

These financial statements have been prepared under the accrual basis of accounting except for the donations and Zakat which are recognized on receipt basis and historical cost convention.

3.4 Taxation

The foundation has applied to be registered as a Non-Profit Organization under section 2(36)C of Income Tax Ordinance, 2001 (the Ordinance) and is entitled to tax credit under section 100C of the Ordinance. The provision of minimum tax is also not applicable on the trust under Clause 11A of part 4 of second schedule of the Income Tax Ordinance.

3.5 General Fund

The fund is used for all general purposes of the society. Any surplus / (deficit) arising out of operations of the society is transferred from income and expenditure account to this fund.

3.6 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are carried in the balance sheet at cost. Cash and cash equivalents comprise of cash in hand and cash with banks on current accounts.

3.7 Trade and other payables

Liabilities for trade and other payables are carried at cost which is the fair value of the consideration to be paid in future for goods and services received, whether or not billed to the society.
